

Dialogue with Rob Zur Schmiede, Newly Elected City Council Member


The This past election, it has been a tradition that U Temple Hills sponsor a candidates' forum. In our early years, these forums were held in homes, but the past 15 years we co-sponsored forums with the Top of the World Neighborhood Association (TOWNA) and also once with the South Laguna Civic Association (SLCA). We always reported the results in our newsletter. Because this past year, The Independent sponsored three forums, including one for neighborhood associations, we decided not to have a forum but to submit two questions for all the candidates, one relating to the pedestrian walkway planned for Temple Hills Drive, the other regarding acquisition of open space in Park and Rimrock Canyons. We also agreed to meet and discuss issues with any newly elected candidate to the City Council, so on November 25th a delegation from our Steering Committee met with Rob Zur Schmiede. Our meeting of two hours covered discussion on the pedestrian walkway, open space, possible miniparks, undergrounding Thalia utilities, issues relating to Laguna Canyon Road, the problems with the School District (especially on St. Ann's Drive by the High School), and San Onofre storage of spent nuclear waste. It was a friendly and open discussion in search of solutions to problems. Rob is a planner, having served many years on the Planning Commission and his expertise and knowledge were immensely helpful. We thank him for sharing ideas with us and wish him success in his years ahead on the City Council.

Bruce Hopping and Local Swim Program

L ast month *The Independent* reported that after many years of imploring city and school officials to ensure that all local children learn to swim, Temple Hills resident Bruce Hopping got his wish when the City Council approved a free pilot program to begin this summer. The new program will offer free swim lesson to up to 50 low-income children, aged three to 13 years. Now 93 years old, Bruce may still be seen every day walking down Thalia to the beach. Persistency does pay off. Congratulations, Bruce, for your letting us know your concerns and your generosity to the community.

The Activities of the Neighborhood Groups

With the founding of the association in the early 1970s, the idea was to have a broadly based Steering Committee with each member responsible for a task and to decentralize Temple Hills through a geographical organization of neighborhood groups (see accompanying map). Presently we are in the process of reviving the groups in order to build community spirit and unity. Each group would be focused on problems in your immediate neighborhood. This is a way to become involved without assuming a lot of responsibility but to bring us together to resolve local problems. For example, a group could organize a bloc social, a practice throughout our area. It could bring neighbors together to resolve a dispute, say over development, blockage of views. Walkway and Aliso Creek

Over the years, Bob Borthwick has been involved in pushing for a pedestrian walkway from Aliso Beach to the conserved lands of Aliso and Wood Canyons Wilderness Park. With the recent Coastal Commission approval of a permit for the Ranch at Laguna Beach, it appears that Bob's vision of many years ago soon will be realized.

However, the U.S. Corps of Engineers is unveiling plans for controlling Aliso Creek and its flood plain that becomes a problem in the wilderness park during heavy rainfall. Over the years, small dams and riprap have been placed to slow the movement of water, but in the process the terrain has been so altered as to change the natural direction of the creek altogether. The Corps is offering a series of alternative plans for control and protection of sewer pipes that presently traverse the canyons. The new plans should be ready for public review in May 2015. Of course, the ideal solution would be to rethink all the old and new projects and find a way to restore the canyon lands and control flooding in natural ways. done it again. They created changes within the Village on High School property, which affect our views without input from neighbors prior to plant-


ing the bank surrounding the baseball field with 80 trees. Half of the trees will grow to be 60' plus. Ocean view is important to all of us and with this forest of trees, many THCA members will be affected by the blockage of views with the use of Coastal Oak and Eucalyptus trees. In addition, the Eucalyptus is also a major fire hazard and of concern to many of us.

The baseballs continue to plummet our neighborhoods on St. Ann's, Browncroft, Fen Way and Wilson Streets, with over 800 baseballs collected to date. Since the field was reoriented, it is just a matter of time before someone gets hit by a baseball flying over the fence at an alarming rate of speed. We can only imagine what the consequences will be.

There is a scheduled workshop with School Board members and the public on March 5 at 5:30 p.m. at the School District offices. We urge anyone who is concerned about our public safety from baseballs and blockage of our treasured views to attend this meeting of utmost importance to us all. — Stephen & Jamie Crawford \clubsuit



Design Review

remple Hills used to have a process whereby devel-L oper plans were submitted to a committee of planners, developers, and architects in Temple Hills and their recommendation would be shared with neighbors and developers in the hope that consensus could be found as to what to do and resolve any concerns. This became time consuming and cumbersome, however. So today when projects come before Design Review, concerned neighbors are encouraged to examine proposed plans, available for review at the Community Development Department at City Hall. The City's goal is "to encourage all interested parties to work together to resolve concerns prior to the initial design review hearing, whenever possible. Neighbors and applicants are equally responsible in working toward a positive outcome."

The association rarely takes a position on local projects but is available to help neighbors find ways toward resolution of problems. Our assumption is that a local problem is best solved by neighbors impacted by development. \clubsuit

San Onofre and Spent Fuel

HCA has long been concerned for the spent nuclear L fuel remaining at the closed facilities in San Onofre. Thanks to public pressure, the Laguna City Council recently unanimously passed a resolution that asks the federal government to find permanent storage and in the interim to store the dangerous fuel in a secure and less-populated location. The resolution holds Southern California Edison responsible for resolving the problem, itself of imminent danger to Laguna and nearby urban residents who live so close to the facility. A further concern is the cost to utilities users in Laguna and elsewhere who will have to pay for it. \mathbf{A}


