Planning in Temple Hills

[The following was sent by the Steering Committee to the City Council in April 2002, and most of the issues and projects continue to be considered]

The Temple Hills Community Association would like to reiterate a number of concerns and seek your support of our activities.

First, some 25 years ago we were encouraged to put together a specific plan for the Temple Hills area. A plan was developed through broad participation, but only portions of it were implemented through the years. The City's recent Vision Process suggests that neighborhoods focus on specific concerns in relation to design review and the planning process. We should like to revisit our old plan and work with the City in formulating guidelines for our neighborhood. We have shared our maps and plan with Monica Tuchscher, and ask that she be permitted to work with us in elaboration of a new plan. In particular, we are concerned with height and setbacks because they affect the character of the neighborhood and intrude upon existing views.

Several specific concerns related to our plan involve the pedestrian walkway along Temple Hills Drive. Long ago, the City committed to a walkway but the process has drawn out over the years. Carol Olson and her committee have been pushing this project, and we would like to become more involved in the design and planning of the walkway, and have asked Chris Ricketts to lead us in this direction; we also assume that the walkway will initially be established in the lower portion of the hill, but that it also will extend up the hill to the water tank that marks our neighborhood boundary.

Our Steering Committee also resolved to enhance the traditional walk-through from Temple Hills Drive to Temple Terrace on the Catholic Church property contiguous to the Water District site.

We also would like to revive our planning to open up some of the Water District sites for mini-parks that we very much need in Temple Hills.

Finally, we desire to place on the map of trails the traditional walkway through the hill toward the beach for which easements exist but are threatened by new home construction. We have called this issue to the attention of Ken Frank, the Open Space Committee, and the Planning Department, but to date it remains unresolved. 4Ω

We Can Report Progress During the Year!

A ttending last year's annual party were many new members who have become involved in the Steering Committee. This has brought new life to the association in the form of working toward the implementation of old and new initiatives, including an updating of the members list, substantial increase in memberships, extension of undergrounding into the Cerritios-Dunning area, and an effort to underground Upper Temple Hills and the Thalia area as well.

Neighborhood bloc parties are catching on and bringing neighbors together, and it is hoped that this practice will spread throughout the hill.

An effort is underway to revive the Neighborhood Groups around such issues as Neighborhood Watch, development problems, undergrounding of utilities, membership, and so on.

The pedestrian walkway project is now in the planning mode for the lower part of the hill. The City is planning to start work on the lower portion of the project, Dunning Drive to Temple Terrace, in the spring. The walkway will be on the right as one goes up the hill. We are working on design for the lower portion and the upper portion that will be implemented in a later phase.

Another goal will be to restore the easements and pedestrian path through the hill toward the beach.

We are seeking to implement additional mini-parks in the hill, specifically making use of the water district site next to the church on lower Temple Hills.

The Temple Hills Specific Plan that was put together in the middle 1970s and implemented only in part is being revisited with the hope of enhancing planning for the neighborhood. — The Steering Committee k_{P}



Temple Hills Walkway **Scheduled**

[The following is an update from Carol Olson, chair of the walkway committee.]

The good news is that the final design for Temple Hills Walkway is due to be completed by the end of November. According to the city engineers' Special Projects Inventory presented to the City Council on 9/ 30/02: The project is scheduled to be advertised for construction in December, with bid opening in January 2003. A construction contract will be awarded in February. Construction will begin in March, and will be completed by the end of April. We are keeping our fingers crossed that we progress according to this plan.

According to the report, other pathway improvements along Temple Hills Drive involved minor pavement widening and striping modifications that were incorporated with the Temple Hills Area Street Resurfacing project. 🏠

- THCA agreed to co-host a candidates forum with Top of the World Neighborhood Association at City Hall on October 10

Enhancement of the Walkway?

[In August, Dave Walker sent the following letter to the City Planning Department. At the September meeting of the THCA Steering Committee, \$1000 was allocated to support the concept of brick banding along the new walkway.]

fter reviewing the plans and talking with Mark A Trestik in planning, we are very pleased that a stamped-brick banding, an exposed aggregate finish or



scoring lines are being considered for the finish of the walkway. The association believes that a stamped usedbrick banding finish, at 10' intervals, would be the best alternative for two reasons. 1. The rough surface would discourage skateboarders. 2. Esthetically, it would be a brighter contrast than the other two alternatives.

Has any consideration been given to the possibility of leaving some open areas in the concrete along the 6' wide section of walkway for the planting of small native shrubs and water percolation during the rainy season? Where the sidewalk is narrower, the areas along the caisson retaining wall, planting at the base of the wall would break up the massive look from the downhill side and also discourage teenagers from climbing over.

Please take the above comments into consideration in the final stages of the planning and bidding process of the walkway. We believe that these ideas could be incorporated into the project with a minimum of cost with and would maximize the ascetic quality of the project for our community.

In Memorium

Flor de Witte, who died December 23, 2002, was born in Venezuela, moved to Laguna Beach in 1954, and purchased the family home on Temple Hills Drive in 1958. She was both a good friend and good neighbor.
