

get as possible for construction, and, therefore, doing the design in-house. However, lack of available in-house manpower has necessitated the services of a consultant. The consultant is currently preparing a preliminary design that we will be taking to the Design Review Board. An informational letter is being sent to all Temple Hills property owners to update them on the project and to solicit public opinion prior to the Design Review hearing. You should be receiving the update letter soon. Thanks for your patience.

What is Your Walkway Vision?

As you know if you read the article in the previous THCA newsletter, the latest City plan for the walkway has it extending from Thalia to Dunning, on the ocean side of Temple Hills. But how will it look?

The City is planning a concrete sidewalk directly adjacent to the roadway curb and gutter. That sounds like a downtown sidewalk, not a neighborhood walkway. Won't that look too urban? Surely we can do better.

What about colored, patterned concrete that could look like interlocking brick, or cobblestone, or whatever would fit the vista? In the past, THCA has suggested a landscaped treatment to further beautify the walkway. When were the creative, aesthetic ideas taken off the table?

The City says, once developed, the plans will be presented for comment at a community meeting. We need to think about our own vision for the walkway now, so we can be prepared to comment when asked. A concrete slab sidewalk? We can do better!

Historically, the Temple Hills Community Association has gotten the community together to react to a given issue such as the utility undergrounding or the pedestrian walkway. Working together we have achieved great results! If you are skeptical, just look out your window at the beautiful ocean view, undisturbed by thick black wires and ugly utility poles.

It is not just the large-scale improvement projects for which the Community Association is a catalyst. Don't forget about the power of banding together the community in maintaining and improving our day-to-day quality of life. Did you know that through the Steering Committee, the Temple Hills Community Association writes numerous letters to various agencies in order to get resolutions regarding neighborhood issues?If you have issues that THCA could help with, please call one of the Steering Committee members.

In the future, it is envisaged that community associations will become more involved in City planning projects. For example, consider the pilot projects that will stem from Vision Laguna. Once the final Vision document is approved by council, phase 2 of the process will be to prioritize projects for funding and implementation. For instance, if the creation of pocket parks becomes a priority item, specific locations will be sought. The specific potential park locations and design concepts that are already in the planning stages will be first in line. But it will not be City Hall that identifies potential projects. This type of planning will be done at the community level. We in the Temple Hills neighborhood have the advantage of a long-running, well-established community association. By working with the THCA, we can get things done! Think about ideas you have for improvement; call one of the Steering Committee members listed in the newsletter.

Church Expansion Proposed

Last month, the development plan for St. Catherine Lof Sienna Church was presented to Design Review. The church fronts Temple Terrace and backs onto

Temple Hills. The plan consisted of roughly doubling the 5000-square-foot facility by adding classrooms, meeting rooms and associated non-congregational space. The plan included an at-grade entrance onto Temple Terrace, and an extensive landscaping plan on the Temple Hills side.

While most of the neighbors who spoke at the Design Review meeting seemed to appreciate the architectural beauty of the proposed re-model, serious concerns were voiced. While there is not room to articulate all the concerns here, the most prevalent included:

- The residents living below the church (e.g., Lombardy Lane) felt the proposed massing of the church was too great, extending the existing building to within five feet of the Water District property. Parking and traffic circulation were also a major concern, but due to an existing zoning exemption, these impacts cannot be considered by the Design Review Board!
- The residents living above the church (e.g., Temple Hills Dr.) were concerned that the extensive tree plantings proposed behind the church would seriously impact views. Also, a concern was raised about the loss of the "informal" pedestrian path that runs along the south boundary of the church property linking the Temple Hills neighborhood to the Lower Temple Hills and Village neighborhoods.

In response, the church was very receptive to the neighbors' concerns. They agreed to develop a new plan that would reduce the long, linear massing along Temple Terrace, most likely by attempting to utilize land behind the church, leaving a greater setback on the south side of the property. It was also agreed that a large transformer originally planned directly adjacent to Temple Terrace would be re-located. A new landscape plan, with the higher-growing vegetation close to the church and reducing in height as the ground elevation increased toward Temple Hills, would be developed. However, the

proposed vast row of tall palm trees that concerned the neighbors did not seem to get addressed. In addition, the pathway linkage will be revisited.

What's next? The new plan is scheduled to be presented to Design Review on April 18th. (Design Review is held in the evening at the Council Chambers of City Hall. The plans are available for review at City Hall the week of the presentation. You can call the City on April 18th to where on the agenda the church proposal is scheduled.) Again, the neighborhood will have he opportunity to comment. The last set of comments really made a difference to the project, so please attend the meeting and voice your opinion so that the resulting church renovation is something everyone will be happy with. — Chris Ricketts ♠

Temple Hills Undergrounding Phase II, Update

Well, a year has passed with some progress having been made. The City is waiting to hear from Edison. As most people are aware, Edison ran into financial trouble, which really slowed them down in getting their part of the plan finished. A big concern was who was going to do the work on Edison's part. First it was going to be inside their company, then outside.

According to the City, Edison is now trying to complete their plans in the next six to eight weeks. Once the plans are in and evaluated, the City will be sending a letter detailing the plan, cost and potential schedule to the residents affected.
