Report: Land Use Element and House-size Limits

At a recent meeting of Village Laguna, it was disappointing to hear that the language of the proposed section on preserving the distinctive character of our neighborhoods is vague and conditional. At a subsequent meeting, neighborhood associations were invited to attend and consider taking a position on strengthening that section of the plan.

At the second meeting, the concern about oversized houses in our neighborhoods was widely shared and neighborhood associations were urged to take the opportunity provided by the Land Use Plan revision workshops to give input.

The design-review ordinance and the single-family residential standards of the City already require that new houses be compatible in scale with their neighbors, but out-of-scale houses are being approved all over town. One of the ideas that seemed to fit our community is an upper limit based on the median size of houses in the 300-foot noticing area. So far, no such provision has been included in the draft of the Land Use Element.

The draft element does include the idea of neighborhood specific plans, but it's obvious that this would take a very long time, and meanwhile, neighborhoods that need to be protected would be changing.

House-size limits are in effect in at least 30 California cities. They exist in Laguna in Three Arch Bay, the village center of South Laguna, and Arch Beach Heights. There seems to be no reason we can't have neighborhood-specific limits citywide.

A number of neighborhood associations and community organizations have written to the Planning Commission and City Council in support of house-size limits. If Temple Hills Community Association wants to support this concept, it should do so as soon as possible. The Planning Commission will send its recommendations to the City Council before the end of the year.

Neighbors Object to Commercial Signs and View Obstruction at High School

The Laguna Beach Unified School District is reevaluating its Policy 1001, which allows commercial advertising signage on Laguna Beach school athletic fields. Two of its criteria for commercial signage are that it "is subdued and tasteful" and "does not have a negative impact on the community or immediate neighborhood." We contend that advertising signs and banners on the fencing are not subdued and tasteful, and do negatively impact the community and surrounding neighborhoods. Furthermore, the commercial signage has a negative impact in that it detracts and cheapens the look of the high school's new multimillion-dollar sports complex.

The extensive signage on the fencing appears frightfully unattractive to the community. We do not wish to offend the Boosters who sell signage to raise revenue for the students participating in sports nor to insult local merchants who advertise their businesses. We believe that there may be other methods beside signage to raise revenue without negatively affecting aesthetics and property values.

Those of us who live in homes that overlook LBHS sincerely believe that we should try

to improve the look of our neighborhood and attempt to preserve property values. We do not understand why we who live near schools are treated as "less than" other residents of Laguna Beach. We are told to accept things no one else would accept.

Commercial signage is incompatible with the look of our community and neighborhoods. It further destroys residential views, which have already been ruined by the 30'-high baseball fence, resulting in many homeowners losing their unobstructed ocean views and in a decline of property values. We will never get used to looking at the ocean and sunset through poles and fencing. The neighbors' idea of telescoping poles and retractable netting has been rejected by the School Board, which claims there was a lack of interest by outside contractors.

At the September 12, 2006, School Board meeting, Board Member El Hathaway stated that there is now funding available for school team uniforms and equipment. This is a very significant policy change. This funding would take the pressure off the Booster parents to raise revenue. The neighbors and community would also benefit by this change in policy by preserving any remaining aesthetics and halting further loss of property values. The School Board is studying this issue and will announce its decision at a public meeting in October or November 2006.

THCA Letter to School District

(The following letter was sent by the THCA Steering Committee to School Board Members and Superintendent Theresa Daem on September 20, 2006)

In our 2004 communications to the School Board, we expressed objections to the backlit high school sign on Park Avenue, as well as commercial advertising around school athletic fields. We remain dissatisfied that the backlit sign has not been changed. However, we are hopeful that your current reconsideration of commercial advertising on athletic fields will result in new policies that are satisfactory to the community and surrounding neighborhoods.

It is our opinion that advertising signage and banners on athletic field fences result in commercialization of the School District. This signage is unattractive and obtrusive. It cheapens the look of the schools, is incompatible with the appearance of the community, further blocks views, and lowers property values of homes in surrounding neighborhoods.

A couple years ago, Superintendent Daem assured THCA representative, Ron Chilcote, that signage would not occur in the future. At about the same time, in a meeting on the baseball fields, School Board President, El Hathaway stated, "There will be no more banners." THCA strongly urges the School Board and administration to keep their promises. Please put a stop to this undesirable commercialization of the schools' athletic facilities. \clubsuit


Verna is Back!

Temple Hills Questions for Candidates

- 1) A couple years ago, THCA representatives met with city planning staff to consider implementation and update of our specific plan, formulated in 1975 and partially implemented over the years but never formally approved. Our concerns included second-level additions that block views and undermine the single-level homes agreed to originally when Temple Hills was subdivided during the 1930s. We also have a concern about "mansionization" and new homes not being compatible with neighborhoods. We were assured that a new ordinance resolved our concerns with the large homes on hillsides, and that there was no need for a new plan. However, our lives continue to be impacted by construction of massive structures. How do you feel about neighborhood specific plans and retaining the traditional character of neighborhoods?
- 2) Temple Hills has desired a safe walkway (not sidewalk) down one side of Temple Hills Drive above the sharp bend. Our idea was to have this with a buffer, partially landscaped, both for aesthetic and safety reasons. Do you support this project?
- 3) THCA desires to save Rimrock Canyon and has approached conservation buyers interested in purchasing private lands. Public funds may be necessary. What are your thoughts about purchase and conservation of this pristine area?
- 4) Traditional pathways exist on our hill with easements designated to allow people to walk to downtown areas. These are threatened by remodeling and new construction. The city has supported keeping these pathways open, yet there is need for improvement and budgeting of modest funds. Would you support this concept and help us to implement our plan to upgrade these pathways?
- 5) The THCA neighborhood has experienced increased commercial aircraft noise. What will you do, if elected, to address this issue and reduce the noise and number of flights flying over our neighborhood?
- 6) Temple Hills residents have objected to school projects that intrude upon our views such as the gym at Thurston, the reconfiguration of the baseball field at the high school, and the backlit sign at the corner on Park Avenue. Would you support design review for such projects in future to ensure that resident needs be met?

- 7) THCA objects to the commercialization of the schools that hang banners advertising local business. *How do you feel about this?*
- 8) THCA has objected to the excessive expenditure for a corporation yard in the Act V parking lot and has encouraged the city to build the Village Entrance project. What are your views?


