Vote for Measure W on March 5 — The Orange **County Central Park and Nature Preserve**

THCA has long opposed an international airport at L El Toro and favors the creation of the Orange County Great Park. The plan would open up the possibility for setting aside a thousand-acre nature preserve, establishing science and art museums, botanical gardens, a library, a recreation complex, and educational facilities around a large central lake. This wonderful public facility promises to enhance Orange County's economy, expand educational opportunities, and provide recreational facilities for families to enjoy.

Supervisor Tom Wilson, who opposes the airport, writes about a County report on the fiscal impact of this initiative:

Measure M merely excludes certain developments, • including the airport, from reuse options

It accommodates opportunities such as the park, • museums and educational facilities.

It would not significantly increase County revenues or expenditures

It does not impose a new tax or tax increase

The THCA Steering Committee at its January 28 meeting reaffirmed its commitment to oppose the airport and urges all residents to vote for Measure W on March 5. 🏠

Canyon Open Space Secured

ore than a decade ago, eight thousand of us M marched across the hills to the Jim Dilley Greenbelt Preserve (Sycamore Hills) to protest threatened development by the Irvine Company in Laguna Canyon. Sub-



sequently, the City negotiated to purchase the land, but the City was unable to make payment on planning area 5 that extends to the limit of the City of Irvine. However, negotiations throughout last year resulted in an important gift of this land by the Irvine Company and assurance that it would remain open space. Only the land from the Irvine border to the southeast of the Canyon road remains as potentially developed.

This is an appeal for all of us to rally behind the Laguna Canyon Conservancy, the Laguna Canyon Foundation, and the Laguna Greenbelt in their efforts to make sure all the canyon is forever preserved. \mathbf{A}

20 Ways To Cleaner Oceans and Beaches...

GET YOUR MIND OUT OF THE GUTTER

Sweep your driveways and sidewalks. Put trash in the can instead of the gutter. Use your lawn clippings to fertilize your lawn.

PULL YOUR OWN WEEDS

The less herbicides and pesticides you spray, the less you will swim in on the weekend.

PLANT, DON'T PAVE

Let the runoff water soak into the ground. Landscaping looks better and creates oxygen.

SCOOP THE POOP

Unless you like to swim in animal poop, make sure you and your neighbor pick up the droppings.

REPORT FULL CATCH BASINS

The Department of Public Works should clean a full storm sewer.

FIX YOUR CAR LEAKS

More oil enters the beach from urban runoff than from tanker spills. If your car drips, the oil will find its way to the ocean.

DON'T BE A DRIP

Low-flow shower heads, drip irrigation and low-flow toilets conserve water. Repair any leaks.

MINIMIZE WATER LOSS

Water lawns in the mornings or evenings. Water deep and less often for happier plants.

USE NON-TOXICS

Vinegar or baking soda clean very well. Buy eco-sensitive products now available on the market.

OIL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL

Recycle your motor oil at a garage. Don't dump it into a storm drain. [Pete's Automotive at the foot of Thalia is an oil recycling center]

RECYCLE. ONCE IS NOT ENOUGH

Recycle reusable materials. Call 1-800-RECYCLE for drop-off location.

BE AWARE OF STORM DRAINS

The trash and toxins that are dumped on the street run straight to the beaches. If we reduce the amount of slime that goes into our storm drains, our coastal waters will be protected.

DON'T WATER THE DRIVEWAY

It won't grow. All that water washes to the beach. (Continued on page 4.)

Vision for Laguna



fter many months and the participation of two Athousand residents, Laguna Beach Vision Steering Committee presented its final report to the City. Its membership includes THCA resident Marion Jacobs. Resident Chris Ricketts also was deeply involved in a couple of the committees. The report is available at City Hall and the Laguna Beach Public Library.

Common themes run through the report: love for the City and the preservation of its unique place in the history and future of Southern California. Other priorities include: striving for a vital, people-oriented downtown; development of a community-based neighborhood task force; preservation of historical resources; and better communication through town meetings. There was a proposal for a community arts center and artist live-work facilities, and a committee to ensure preservation of the environment, including open space and beaches and ocean. There were recommendations to increase ridership of the city transit system, the only one in the county, and dedication of more of downtown to pedestrian use.

Dave Walker writes that Laguna should emulate the good shuttle service that runs throughout town every 15 minutes in places like Mammoth. His idea is that people would park in a structure in the canyon and be shuttled downtown to save time trying to find parking spaces. "Putting a large pay parking structure as far out in the canyon as possible would keep the traffic out of the downtown area," he suggested.

Delivery of organic produce to Laguna Beach is fi-nally under way. Thanks to the untiring efforts of Ron Chilcote, deliveries to the first ten interested families began on Thursday, January 17. Only ten can be accommodated now, but sign up if you are interested in getting produce in the spring. This necessitates a \$150 deposit and guarantees your participation for 2002-2003.



Marian Farms is run by Gena Nonini and provides organic and biodynamic produce. The farm is located in Fresno and currently delivers to others in Orange County. Marian Farms is run as a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA). This means that when you sign up, you are making a commitment to support a small farm and farmer. In exchange, you receive the very best available organic produce. In general, deliveries are made from November to June with seasonal fruits and vegetables. You select either a standard-size box (full share for about \$33 per week) or a small box (half share for about \$20 per week). There is a possibility of continuing deliveries through the summer. Payment is expected either monthly, bi-seasonally or seasonally as determined when you sign up. Our local coordinator is Chris Sullivan (949-640-0996), and for now our produce will be picked up at her home in Corona del Mar and brought to Laguna. When we have 25 people, we will be able to have the produce delivered to Laguna Beach.

Walkway Update

Mark Trestik of the City says staff has received a base plan drawing for the Temple Hills Pathway. Staff had hoped to have a meeting with concerned citizens to present their proposed plan for the pathway and the costs in December or January, but now feel it will be February or March.

The city still plans to put in a sidewalk, retaining walls and a railing where applicable between Dunning and Thalia on the ocean side, and do only a little pavement widening in places above Dunning on Temple Hills. Alternatively, they are considering turning the path and going down through the water district or the church land.

Mark says that he is curious to talk to people in the lower Temple Hills area about which of the two options are most appealing: turning the pathway down through the water district or the church land or continuing straight along Temple Hills to Thalia. If you want to give feedback on this issue to Mark Trestik, our liaison with the City, call him at 497 0300.

Each resident should receive a letter from the City when the next city meeting occurs, so watch your mail. We are pleased that the project is progressing smoothly. We are excited to see this 25-plus-year project coming to fruition. - Carol Olson 🏠
