Issues and goals identified during the 2005 year were:

- Overall to have a big "win" for the Annual Meeting each year
- Build community spirit
- Social events: Annual Party and bloc/street parties (recently St. Ann's, San Remo, Oak St., Coast View and others).
- Problems with trash cans on the hill (several small ones was one suggestion)
- Revitalizing Neighborhood Watch
- High School items: Stadium lights (mercury vapor) seem exceptionally bright and are on frequently at night; resolve poles and fencing problem.
- Open space (Rimrock Canyon and Park Canyon properties were brought up)
- Lights on the Circle K are too bright (an awning might solve the problem)
- Neighborhood sign for Temple Hills
- Walkway project continuing up Temple Hills
- Problem of drainage and flooding once streets were resurfaced (cement berms better than asphalt berms and could be required with home improvement)
- Undergrounding upper Temple Hills and Thalia
- Issues outside Temple Hills to focus on: Montage intrusion into wilderness area of Aliso Canyon, Village Entrance and Act V.

# In Support of St. Ann's Neighbors

[On behalf of the Steering Committee, Ron Chilcote presented the following letter to the City Council at its meeting on January 4, 2005]

Neighbors of lower Temple Hills are meeting with you tonight to review in public hearing their complaints about reconfiguration of the High School baseball field and view blockage caused by high poles and fencing. We ask that you find a process that ensures cooperation with the School District over future projects and that you work with neighbors to resolve the problem of preserving their views and, in particular, accept their recommendation for telescoping poles around the field.

Our Steering Committee has been concerned for some time (with elaborate documentation through our newsletter) about the impact of Laguna Beach School District decisions regarding construction, including lighting and signage at the High School, the gymnasium at Thurston Intermediate School, and the reconfiguration of the baseball field at the High School. Neighborhood residents are insisting that the School District collaborate with the City in a design review that would ensure community participation in decision-making.

We appreciate your consideration of our concerns. 🏠

When neighbors inquired with a worker, they were told the grading was for soil erosion to protect the water reservoir, which was apparently untrue since neither the Water District nor the City knew anything about it. # More News and Updates Regarding High School Athletic Fields

**R**esidents again beseeched the City Council to reign in the School Board at the January 4, 2005, City Council meeting. We believe the School Board's project, the Laguna Beach High School athletic fields, should be subject to our local Design Review Process.

The School Board's position is that the reconfigured baseball field and its new fence are "repair and maintenance." Coming from a legal standpoint, reconfiguring the field and removing the old fence, and replacing it with new and higher fencing, clearly fall under the definition of "new construction," and not "repair and maintenance," as the School Board contends.

In an attempt to find a solution acceptable to both sides, the City Council decided to act as a mediator. Council Members Steve Dicterow and Jane Egly were selected to act as facilitators at meetings among School Board members, Boosters and neighborhood Steering Committee members. We welcome the participation of the City Council. They will see first hand the lack of meaningful progress that is being made.

The closed-door session was scheduled to take place on February 7, 2005. However, due to illness of one of the City Council facilitators, the meeting was canceled. When the meeting is rescheduled, we will look forward to the results of our proposals for telescoping poles. At the last closed-door session, our Steering Committee provided the School Board with proposals, bids and research from two companies who manufacture telescoping poles.

In our opinion, this project was not well thought out from the beginning. The people who live on St. Ann's are not pleased that we are now living in far center and left fields! Of course, the players' goal is to hit a home run ball over the fence. We fear for the safety of children, pedestrians, motorists and residents outside the ball park. There will also be more foul balls hit onto Wilson Street than before.

This reconfiguring also involved erecting a 30-foot-high backstop and 30-foot-high fencing with 30-foothigh, eight-inch-diameter poles around the field. This has ruined the view corridor of hundreds of homes. It has forever marred the attractive plateau and the unobstructed ocean and tree-lined views. The industrial design has also devastated the look and feel of the neighborhood and substantially lowered our property values.

Unfortunately, the residents near Thurston Middle School also saw the bond money that we all voted for come back right smack in their faces with a huge, boxy gymnasium to look at. It makes one sad, angry and resentful all at the same time.

At Laguna Beach High School, the lighting on the football field has been, and still is, a problem for residents. While it has been improved for some residents, it has remained a problem for others.

The public-address system appears to have been upgraded to many decibels louder, based upon input from neighbors. There is noticeable traffic congestion with an increased number of night sporting events and practices on the football field. It seems that from four to six nights a week, the football/soccer field is in use.

The drainage on the football field is a new major concern. Both the north and south sides of the field flooded onto the track during our recent storms. There is cushioning material on the artificial turf, which is apparently made of recycled tires (combined with whatever else?). This material is currently being analyzed at a lab. On the field are millions of particles the size of grains of sand. These rubber particles floated to the surface during the recent rains. The particles that didn't sheet drain into the storm drain, which flows into the ocean, ended up in piles on the track as the water receded. It is very likely that countless particles drained into the ocean. How do the chemicals in these rubber particles interact with other chemicals in the ocean? How good can this pollution be for the marine habitat?

Given the large number of issues and questions about the new construction, we, as concerned citizens, call the athletic fields into question and again stress the importance of this project going through Design Review.

## 2004 Annual Report

We can report progress during the past year: The annual meeting on September 20, 2003, included a presentation by Mayor Toni Iseman who covered community and City issues, answered questions and promised to assist us with our concerns.

The annual party was a great success, thanks to efforts of Jenny Radisay and her committee.

The pedestrian walkway along Temple Hills Drive was completed, Thanks to Carol Olson and her committee for staying with this project over the years. Lastminute concerns about the style of fence and its appearance were presented in the newsletter, and an assessment showed communication problems in dealing with the City. For example, THCA had offered funds to work in a brick appearance with the cement, but the City never responded to our offer.

The City's Open Space Committee is working with residents to open up pedestrian paths through the hill. These paths have been used for more than half a century.

We are continuing efforts to find ways to secure open space above Park Canyon and in Rimrock Canyon.

The Steering Committee met several times since the last annual meeting. Among concerns locally are possible signage for Temple Hills and, thanks to Richard Holmes, the establishment of our new website (see thca@info). The Steering Committee supported Friends of Laguna Creek and the Village Entrance Project but opposed development of a City Corporate Yard at the Act V parking lot. There was deep concern over the School District gym at Thurston Intermediate School and its lights and obstruction. There is also opposition to the view blockage on the high school baseball field.

THCA will cosponsor with Top of the World Association a candidates' forum at City Hall on Monday, October 18.

Three issues of the Newsletter have appeared since the last annual meeting. The newsletter has been consistently published over the past 32 years and is one of the oldest civic newspapers in Laguna Beach. 4
